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More safety, more comfort & more fun with new 2020 Swift

uzuki Swift is New Zealand's favourite small car so it's not hard to spot them on the road. But if you look closely you'll notice shiny new 2020 Swifts starting to appear with some exciting changes both inside and out.

A new grille with a chrome centre strip sets the 2020 Swift apart from the crowd. What you can't see, is the fancy new safety and comfort features hidden beneath those stylish curves. Features that used to be considered 'top spec' or optional extras come standard in the 2020 Swift.

Joining the ground-breaking Swift Hybrid, the latest generation is available in GL and RS models with all the auto versions achieving a 5 star ANCAP rating. Even the least expensive GL gains front fog lamps and 16-inch alloy wheels. The auto version is equipped with CVT (continuously variable transmission) for seamless, smooth shifting. And as well as packing in all the features of

the manual, it adds a 7-inch touchscreen infotainment system with reversing camera.

Both GL and RS models now sport digital speed readouts and LED daytime running lamps. There's electrically adjustable door mirrors, rear privacy glass, and a leather steering wheel. As if that wasn't enough, cruise control and speed limiter are now standard GL features too.

The RS is the secret surprise in the Swift range because thanks to Suzuki's continuously evolving technology, there are some significant safety upgrades hidden inside. Along with heated door mirrors, blind spot monitor and rear parking sensors, the RS incorporates an advanced forward detection system. This can help you mitigate the damage from a collision – or even actively assist you in avoiding it altogether.

A new safety feature is Rear Cross Traffic Alert which helps you back out of spaces where vision is obscured. While the RS has a reversing camera sometimes people or other cars might pass behind you, for example, when you're reversing down a driveway or backing out of a supermarket carpark. The system uses two rear mounted side radar sensors to alert you if anything is approaching on either side as you reverse. You get both a visual alert on the information display and a warning sound.

If 'secret' isn't your thing, you can always make your Swift 'pop' by opting for a black roof which is available exclusively on red or blue 2020 RS models. **Test drive a 2020**Swift at your Suzuki dealer today.



Road trip ready?

It's summer again, and with no overseas travel there's never been a better time for a **great Kiwi road trip**. Thanks to Suzuki reliability it's easy to just jump in and go, but sometimes stuff happens, and it pays to be prepared. Here are some tips to help you become roadie ready.

CHECK UNDER THE HOOD

A service will cover most of these but it's a good idea to have a look, check the fluids and get to know your car a little better. The things you're looking for should be brightly coloured and easy to find:

ENGINE OIL LEVEL – It's best to check this when the engine is warm, but not running. The dipstick has a yellow handle, pull it out, wipe with a clean rag or paper towel, push back in then pull out again. The oil level should sit between

MAX and MIN marked on the stick.

COOLANT – You're looking for a transparent white plastic bottle with the upper and lower limits marked on the outside. If you have to open the radiator cap, make sure the engine is cold. If additional coolant is required please see your Suzuki dealer for the correct coolant to add.

WIPER FLUID – this may not sound important but you don't want it to suddenly become important when you get splashed by a passing truck or a bug goes splat right in the middle of your field of vision. Use proper solution (like Bars Bugs), plain water won't work and dishwashing liquid can mark your paintwork.

INSPECT YOUR TYRES

Check the pressures and condition when you fill up at the petrol station.
Running the correct pressure (check driver's inside door) helps you stay safe and maximise fuel efficiency. Don't forget to check your spare as well.

GET SOME EMERGENCY TOOLS

Alongside your spare wheel (if fitted) and jack, it's a good idea to have jumper cables and a multi tool – useful in many emergency situations, like when you forget a bottle opener.

PUT TOGETHER A MEDICAL KIT

Buy a pre-packed one or fill a Tupperware box yourself.

A good start would be Band-Aids, bandages, scissors,

Panadol, latex gloves and a roll of Duct tape – good

for everything from patching punctured Lilos
to strapping a broken arm.

STASH SOME WATER

Pop a couple of water bottles under the seats – it's great for washing sticky hands, removing sand from feet, putting out small fires... water is free and has so many uses – you can even drink it.

DON'T FORGET YOUR PHONE

In sticky situations your phone is your friend. It's a torch, map, GPS, Candy Crush and of course, you can use it to call AA Roadside Assist. As long as it's charged. So make sure to keep a spare cable in the glovebox.

Lessons in Reliability

Lloyd Mathews has been with the AA Driving School since 1992 He's one of their longest serving instructors and in the course of his career has driven over 1.2 million kilometres – mostly in Suzuki Swifts.

From an early age Lloyd was interested in cars but after working as a mechanic, he realised the thing he really loved, was being out on the road. So he joined the AA Driving School as an instructor and has never looked back. "Being self-employed and in charge of my own hours is great," says Lloyd. "As a keen runner and cyclist I often travel to events.

There's no need to ask the boss for a long weekend - I just ask myself!" he laughs. "Sometimes I've said no!"

Over the years Lloyd has

taught people of all ages from all walks of life. As you can imagine he's had some adventures; students trying to go round roundabouts the wrong way, braking for sparrows, and taking the word 'right' a little too literally. Lloyd remembers a fellow instructor who said "Right, let's keep on this road." The student thought he meant 'right turn' and they nearly ended up in the Heathcote River!

As a professional driver Lloyd chooses Suzuki, and with his years of experience, knows he can always rely on them. "I've always liked the look of the Swifts but really it's been value for money most of all, coupled with great reliability," says Lloyd.

His first Suzuki was a 2008 Swift from
